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REGIMENTAL ORDER, NO. 68.

Head Quarters, First Regiment, First Brigade, C. M., Hartford, Aug. 30th, 1855.

The following promotions and appointments have taken place in the Staff of the Regiment:—Wm. H. Dobie, Engineer, with the rank of Captain; Levi Woodhouse, Adjutant, U. T. Smith, Quarter-Master, with the rank of Lieutenants; G. F. Gorton, Paymaster; Pliny C. Allen, Sergeant Major; Lyman Treat, Quarter-Master Sergeant; Rev'd. C. R. Fisher, Chaplain; Dr. P. W. Ellsworth, Surgeon; James M. Greenleaf, Assistant Surgeon; J. F. Stratton, Trumpet Major; George Merrill, Drum Major; R. Hubbard, Fife Major; and as such they are to be recognized, respected and obeyed accordingly.

The Hartford Cornet Band, Captain J. F. Stratton, has been organized and accepted as Regimental Band.

The Field and Staff Officers will meet at the Exchange Hotel at 8 A. M., September 17th.

The Commandants of Companies will report their Companies to the Adjutant *immediately* on their arrival at the State House, and their positions in the line will be assigned them. The following Regulations for the Encampment are hereby established, and will be strictly conformed to.

On the 17th September,

At 11 A. M., Guard Mounting, at which time four men will be detailed from each Company for guard duty, and will march to the Regimental parade ground under the command of the 1st Sergeants. The Music will also assemble at this and all other parades under the orders of the Adjutant.

The morning reports will be handed to the Adjutants at Guard Mounting.

At 1 P. M., Roast Beef, the Dinner call will be sounded.

At 2 P. M., Company Drills or Company Parades, under Company Officers.

At 3 P. M., REGIMENTAL DRILL.

At 4 P. M., Cavalry Company A. will parade and drill under command of Capt. Ensworth.

At 5 P. M., Signal for Dress Parade.

At 6 P. M., Retreat:—the evening gun will be fired, the flag struck, and sentinels will commence challenging.

At 8 P. M., four privates will be detailed from each Company, and sent under the 1st Sergeant to the officer of the Guard, to relieve his Guard detail of the morning.

At 11 P. M., Tattoo, when all lights will be extinguished, and all noise cease, and no man will be allowed to leave his tent. The Camp will be opened to visitors until Tattoo.

On the 18th.

At 6 A. M., Reveille, and morning gun, when the Companies will fall in without arms, for Roll Call, under their 1st Sergeants, superintended by their Commandants.

At 7 A. M., Peas-upon-a-Trencher, the Breakfast signal.

At 8 A. M., Guard Mounting. The morning reports will be made to the Adjutant at Guard Mounting.

At 10 A. M., Inspection.

At 11 A. M., Regimental Prayers.

At 1 P. M., ROAST BEEF, the Dinner Call.

At 2 P. M., Review by Brig. General Geer.

At 3 P. M., the tents will be struck and the line of march commenced for the State House for dismissal.

The morning and Inspection Reports, being the basis of the Regimental Returns, must be complete, and promptly handed in. The Inspection Reports must be made to the Adjutant before Inspection on the 18th.

No officer or private will be permitted to leave the encampment without permission from the Commandant of the Regiment, and any officer or private so doing, his name will be stricken from the pay roll and returned as being absent.

Ira Wright and C. C. Colson are appointed Sutlers for this encampment, and will make *ample* provision for furnishing the men with rations and at a reasonable price.

Companies upon arriving in the city will send their baggage to the Exchange Hotel, where baggage wagons will be in readiness to convey the baggage to the encampment.

The Colonel expects the co-operation of every officer in enforcing the above Regulations, and in maintaining such a state of discipline as shall render the encampment useful, orderly and instructive.
