
ANESTHESIOLOGY REFLECTIONS FROM THE WOOD LIBRARY-MUSEUM

Byzantine Ivory Scene of the Biblical Sleep of Adam and the Creation of Eve



In Cleveland, Ohio, just a few miles from where Charles K. Teter, D.D.S., founded the United States' second major anesthesia machine manufacturing company, stands the celebrated Cleveland Museum of Art. Housed in that museum is a wood-and-ivory box from Byzantium (later Constantinople, then Istanbul) dating back to ca.1050 CE. One of the carved-ivory scenes (above) on the lid of the box depicts the biblical account from the book of *Genesis* of the creation of Eve after a "deep sleep" falls upon Adam. The Byzantine lettering can be transliterated to ADAM HYPNOSAS EVA EXELTHEN EK TIS PLEURA AUTOU and can be translated to "Here Eve came from out of a flank of sleeping Adam." Generations of scholars have suggested that the *Genesis* account of Adam's heavy slumber strongly resembles the "modern" state of general anesthesia.
